Earthome: Working for a Better Earth

On the Sunday June 30, 2002, just before the CSA meeting, Earthome met to discuss projects inspired by the Earthome video, *The Next Industrial Revolution*, at the Sherwood House.

What is Earthome?

According to the website www.earthome.org, "Earthome ... is built on the premise that the most critical task of the next 50 years is to build a sustainable Earth-human relationship. Earthome members work to make this vision a reality in our own Chesapeake bio-region through research, demonstration and education."

Earthome also helped to start the CSA as one of their early projects.

The meeting at the Sherwood House was centered around this philosophy, specifically in organizing teams to put into practice some of the ideas presented in the Earthome video *The Next Industrial Revolution*.

What is the video?

The Next Industrial Revolution centers around the ideas that architect William McDonough and chemist Dr. Michael Braungart to encourage industries to work towards sustainable methods of creating their products through the concept of Waste = Food.
